Reverend Sir,

I have this day been informed by Corporal W. Crowe of the 5th Battery of the Royal Field Artillery who stayed at your village after the Armistice was signed, that he saw the grave of my brother Lieut. Vincent Waterfall somewhere between Lablian and Enghein. I should much like to know if this is correct and what state the grave is in.

If it is possible for you to have a really good photograph taken of it I should be immensely grateful and would pay you every expense at once.

My brother with Lieut. Bayley was of course the first British soldier killed in the War and if you can get a photo taken I should like the inscription on the Cross to be as plain as possible shewing the date of death, August 22nd 1914.

If you have been to any cost in connection with this grave please let me know and I will pay it. This is the first intimation I have had of this brave boy's resting place.
